

Digital Constitutionalism:
A New Constitutional Moment for Expressions, Privacy and Data Protection

In the last twenty years, the development of digital technologies has not only challenged the protection of individuals' fundamental rights such as freedom of expression and data protection. Even more importantly, this new technological framework has also empowered transnational corporations operating in the digital environment to perform quasi-public functions by profiting from moderating content and processing data on a scale. These two drivers have triggered a new constitutional moment, a new global phase of modern constitutionalism named digital constitutionalism. The primary goal of this presentation is to describe the characteristics of digital constitutionalism, also the EU policy as the leading example on focusing.
